COYOTE TIPS

With a recent coyote sighting in Roslyn, the Nassau County SPCA issued the following safety and behavior tips for residents in the area.

Helpful Tips

- If you see a coyote, dial 911. Do not allow coyotes to approach people or pets.
- Unintentional food sources attracts coyotes, other wildlife and increases risks to people and pets.
- Do not feed coyotes. Discourage others from doing so.
- Do not feed pets outside. If you are feeding feral cats, please stay and observe the feedings and remove all food before leaving.
- Eliminate availability of bird seed.
- Make certain that garbage is inaccessible to wildlife.
- Teach children to appreciate wildlife from a distance as to avoid the risk of being injured.
- If confronted, stand tall, and hold arms out to look large. If a coyote lingers for too long make loud noises, wave your arms, throw sticks and stones. Do not run away, running away after seeing a coyote is behaving like prey.
- Do not allow pets to run free. Supervise all outdoor pets and keep them on a leash. Keep cats indoors.
- Conflicts between dogs and coyotes can happen at any time of the year, but are more likely in the months of March and April. It is during this time that coyotes are setting up their denning areas for the soon-to-arrive pups.

Be aware, people do coexist with coyotes but caution, care and common sense must be used!
